Jackson explores instances of racism in a modern culture where such issues are often swept under the table. He contends that it no longer is politically correct to expose inner feelings that might be deemed as racist, yet that lack of ability to openly explore racist feelings prohibits us as a society from moving forward. He sights examples of well known situations, such as comedian David Chapelle's abrupt departure from Comedy Central, to back up his point. The discussion will be lively and interactive.

His writing has appeared in numerous academic and popular publications, including the New York Times, the Washington Post, South Atlantic Quarterly, and the American Journal of Sociology.
